This experience, compounded by the captivating courses I took within the college of science solidified by interest and enthusiasm for the field of medicine.

After completing my first year of studying at the Miller School of medicine I can confidently say it has been a fantastic experience. Complete with the stereotypically difficult curriculum but also hands-on learning and community activities. One thing in particular that I have been very involved in is the Department of Community Service (DOCS) student run free health clinics and fairs. Volunteering with DOCS reminds me of the memories I made at the SSLP and continually reminds me why I feel in love with medicine from the beginning.
